Bending the Arc of Oral Health Toward Equity

Solutions Series Summary for July 16, 2025

Purpose of the Session

This session focused on exploring the participatory budgeting process developed and used by Smile Spokane. The process was designed to align annual planning, evaluation, and collaborative funding decisions across multiple community strategies. Participants examined lessons learned from Spokane's experience and discussed how these practices could inform other networks' work, including Pierce County.

Project Overview

The participatory budgeting model was created to ensure transparency, accountability, and shared ownership in how funds were allocated among Smile Spokane's anchor strategies. It used a Results-Based Accountability (RBA) framework and emphasized group planning and evaluation to achieve collective oral health goals.

- Arcora Foundation (funding and statewide network support)
- Anchor strategy leads and community-based organizations

How It Works

- Annual planning led by Spokane Regional Health District with each anchor strategy to define focus, logic model, and performance measures.
- Strategies reported progress through "story reports" that summarized activities, outcomes, and plans for the upcoming year.
- All partners participated in annual budget meetings to allocate funding based on collective priorities and performance.
- Trust and transparency evolved over time, shifting the group from competitive funding requests to collaborative decision-making and resource sharing.

Lessons Learned

Success Factors:

Clear and consistent process for planning and funding decisions

- Strong culture of trust and group accountability
- Transparent data sharing and evaluation framework
- Collaborative solutions (e.g., in-kind resource sharing, reduced budget asks)

Challenges:

- Initial competitiveness in funding requests
- Reporting burden on strategy leads (mitigated by evaluator support)
- Partner discomfort with sharing imperfect data early in the process
- Balancing group priorities with individual program needs

Adaptations:

- Partial-year funding used to incentivize sustainable planning
- Match requirements introduced to encourage self-sufficiency
- Focus shifted from solely individual strategies to what benefits the collective whole

Group Sensemaking Highlights

Using GroupMap, participants identified the following as most important:

- 1. Shared goals and priorities (highest-rated theme)
- 2. Transparent and meaningful evaluation processes
- 3. Accountability and group ownership of the collective work
- 4. Local sustainability, including finding external funding and reducing reliance on Arcora

Next Steps

- Share Smile Spokane's facilitator guides and evaluation tools with Pierce County LIN and other networks.
- Pierce County LIN to explore integrating lessons learned to accelerate its own collaborative planning and sustainability efforts.
- Arcora Foundation to convene a meeting with both LINs to align on shared priorities, decision-making structures, and long-term sustainability strategies.
